

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PREFACE.

In this atlas the lettered folios contain descriptions of the manner in which the towns were established and the statutes fixing the various boundary lines, together with detailed descriptions of the lines as they exist at the present time.

Folios 1 and 2 are plans showing the boundary lines of the towns herein described. The locations of the corners or points of intersection of the boundary lines have been determined by triangulation. The town lines are shown in heavy broken lines, and the general scheme of triangulation by which their locations were determined is shown in light lines. Lines extending toward stations beyond the limits of the triangulation sheets have letters of reference to show to what stations they are directed.

Folios 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 give the geographical positions in latitude and longitude of all the corners and the principal stations used as points of control, together with the azimuths, back azimuths, true bearings and distances between them. Following these are folios giving the names of the triangulation stations, with descriptions of a portion of them and of the corners, together with a topographical sketch of the vicinity of each corner. An index to the description of each corner is given in the left-hand column of the position table.

The system of numbering adopted in describing the boundary between each two adjoining towns runs from one three-town corner or four-town corner to the next, increasing from north to south, or from east to west. The principal triangulation stations are shown by name as well as number.

Natural or water boundaries are taken from U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey charts, or from actual surveys plotted on a large scale and reduced to the scale of this plan. Copies of the large scale plans are on file at the office of the Commission.

The triangulation of this survey is based on that of the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey, whose officers have given us material assistance in the adjustment of the triangulation system.

The projection is based on the "Clarke Spheroid" and the astronomical data adopted by the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey in 1880.

The usual form of conventional signs to represent the topography in the vicinity of each bound is adopted, and corresponds substantially with the style adopted by the topographical conference held in Washington, D. C., in 1892.

The principal field work for this group was executed under the direction of Eugene E. Peirce and James B. Tolley, in 1892 and 1893. The present bounds were examined, additional points located, and topographical descriptions revised in 1904.

GENERAL DESCRIPTIONS.

ANDOVER.

The first mention of Andover occurs in the Massachusetts Colony Records under date of May 22, 1646, at which time Cutshamache, an Indian, acknowledged the sale of certain lands known as "Cochichawick" or "Andiver," bounded northerly by Merrimac river and including, besides its present area, the town of North Andover and the portion of Lawrence lying south of Merrimac river.

On May 26, 1658, about fifteen acres of meadow-land near Shawshine river, abutting on Billerica, was set off by the General Court to Andover.

A part of Andover was set off to Middleton June 20, 1728; a part to Lawrence April 17, 1847; and a part was set off to form the town of North Andover April 7, 1855.

BOXFORD.

On the petition of the inhabitants of Rowley Village, a part of Rowley was incorporated into a township August 12, 1685, being first mentioned as Boxford September 14, 1694, in an act for the regulation of the taxes.

On June 20, 1728, a part was set off to the new town of Middleton; on March 21, 1856, a part was set off to Groveland; and on April 15, 1897, a small part was set off to Georgetown.

On June 10, 1808, a part of Rowley, including the estate of Samuel Spofford, was annexed; and on March 7, 1846, a part of Ipswich was annexed.

HAVERHILL.

On May 13, 1640, the Governor, Deputy Governor and Mr. Winthrop Senior, were directed to grant to Mr. Ward and Newberry men a plantation at Patucket or Coijchawick, provided they return answer within three weeks from the 21st. present, and that they build there before the next Court, and on June 2, 1641, a committee was appointed "to set out the bounds between Salsberry and Pantucket, ali: Haverell. They are to determine the bounds which Mr. Ward & his company are to enjoy as a town or village."

Portions of the boundaries of the town were defined in 1651, 1654, 1664 and 1667, and were perfected by the General Court May 12, 1675. The town originally extended from the Merrimac river northerly for a distance of about 10 or 12 miles into what is now New Hampshire. It included the larger portion of the present territory of Lawrence and Methuen.

On May 23, 1650, an island in Merrimac river was granted to Haverhill. On December 8, 1725, the western part of the town of Haverhill, with lands adjoining, were set off and constituted the new township of Methuen.

Haverhill was established as a city March 10, 1869, the act of incorporation being accepted by the town May 15 of the same year.

On January 4, 1897, Bradford was annexed to Haverhill by chapter 365 of the Acts of 1896. Bradford was originally set off from the town of Rowley May 27, 1668, and was first mentioned by name in a tax act dated October 13, 1675. On March 8, 1850, the easterly part of Bradford was incorporated as the town of Groveland.

LAWRENCE.

Parts of Andover and Methuen were incorporated as the town of Lawrence April 17, 1847, and the town became a city March 21, 1853, the town accepting the act of incorporation March 29th of the same year.

On April 4, 1854, part of Methuen was annexed, and on February 4, 1879, parts of Andover and North Andover were annexed.

LYNNFIELD.

On July 3, 1782, the North Parish of Lynn was erected into the district of Lynnfield. The district was made a town February 28, 1814.

On May 27, 1857, when the bounds between Lynnfield and North Reading were established, part of each town was annexed to the other, and the act was accepted by the town of Lynnfield November 3, 1857, and by North Reading January 7, 1858.

METHUEN.

No material changes have been made in the boundaries since its early incorporation.

The western part of the town of Haverhill, with the lands adjoining, a strip about 1 1-2 miles wide next to Dracut line, was erected into the town of Methuen December 8, 1725, and included a considerable area now within the State of New Hampshire. It extended along the Merrimac river "10 miles and 40 pole."

The part of Lawrence lying north of the Merrimac river was set off from Methuen by chapter 190 of the Acts of 1847, incorporating Lawrence, and a subsequent act, passed April 4, 1854, set off another part of Methuen to the same town.

MIDDLETON.

The town of Middleton was incorporated June 20, 1728, being comprised of parts of Andover, Boxford, Salem and Topsfield. The boundaries of the town stand to-day practically as described in the act of incorporation.

NORTH ANDOVER.

The eastern part of Andover was set off and incorporated as the town of North Andover April 7, 1855, and on Feb. 4, 1879, about one hundred and six acres were set off to the city of Lawrence.

NORTH READING.

The northerly portion of Reading was incorporated as the town of North Reading March 22, 1853. On May 27, 1857, when the line between Lynnfield and North Reading was adjusted, a part of each town was annexed to the other.

READING.

An additional grant of land was made to the town of Lynn by the General Court Sept. 9, 1639, for an inland plantation. This settlement was known as Linn Village, and included Reading, South Reading and North Reading. On May 29, 1644, it was ordered that Linn Village be called Redding, and the Court Records state that the bounds between Wooborne and Linn Village (called Redding) were settled on the same date.

On Sept. 25, 1730, the westerly part was set off to form a part of the town of Wilmington; on Dec. 21, 1734, a part was set off to Stoneham; on Feb. 25, 1812, the First or South Parish of Reading was incorporated as the town of South Reading, now Wakefield; on March 22, 1853, the town of North Reading was set off.

WILMINGTON.

The northeasterly part of Woburn, known as "Goshen" and the westerly part of Reading were erected into a township by the name of Wilmington Sept. 25, 1730. In the act of incorporation the western boundary is described as following the Billerica line "including Abraham Jacques, his farm, and so to run from thence on Billerica line one hundred rods farther," etc.; this portion of the act although accepted by the General Court as the divisional line, occasioned more or less dispute and three years later (April 12, 1733) a petition of the selectmen of Billerica was presented to the General Court, stating that under a clause in the incorporative act, the town of Wilmington claimed certain land in the town of Billerica, being part of a tract called Mr. Jacques' farm, "although it was never intended by the Court, nor so much as asked for by the inhabitants that any part of Billerica should be set to Wilmington, but only that part of Mr. Jacques' farm that lay in the town of Woburn." The petitioners prayed that the Court order that the town of Billerica be "continued in the uninterrupted possession of their ancient bounds," presumably a straight line from the present corner 1 of Tewksbury and Wilmington southerly, passing through the present corner. Of Billerica, Burlington and Wilmington. The town of Wilmington opposed this petition, but on June 13, 1733, the General Court decided that the whole of Jacques' farm was in the town of Wilmington. On Dec. 27, 1737, the farms of John Beard and others adjoining the Jacques farm were set off from Billerica to Wilmington.

BOUNDARY LINES.

Massachusetts-New Hampshire Line. — The State line which forms the northerly boundary of this group of towns was fixed by the King in Council under date of Aug. 5, 1740, being surveyed and marked under order of Governor Belcher by George Mitchell and Richard Hazen in 1741. It was re-surveyed and marked by Commissioners representing the two States between the years 1885 and 1898, and the line as marked was later ratified and adopted by the respective States, — Massachusetts by Chapter 369 of the Acts of 1899, and New Hampshire by chapter 115 of the Acts of 1901.

Andover-Dracut Line. — Follows the Merrimac river, being defined by the order of the Court incorporating Dracut Feb. 26, 1702.

Andover-Lawrence Line. — The part of the line west of corner 1 was defined by chapter 190 of the Acts of 1847. The part southerly of corner 1 was defined by chapter 11 of the Acts of 1879.

Andover-Methuen Line. — Defined by chapter 12 of the Laws of 1725.

Andover-North Andover Line. — The part of the line northwest of corner 1 was defined by chapter 11 of the Acts of 1879, and the part southerly of corner 1 by chapter 150 of the Acts of 1855.

Andover-North Reading Line. — Defined by chapter 250 of the Acts of 1904.

Andover-Tewksbury Line. — Defined by chapter 373 of the Acts of 1903.

Andover-Wilmington Line. — This line is a part of the old Andover – Woburn line; no definite statute has been found describing it but, as marked upon the ground, it agrees with the perambulation records and the official map of 1830 on file in the Archives.

Atkinson (N. H.)-Haverhill Line. — Defined by chapter 369 of the Acts of 1899.

Billerica-Wilmington Line. — A portion of this line was established by chapter 2 of the Acts of 1730 incorporating Wilmington, and a portion by an order of the Court Dec. 27, 1737, setting off the estates of John Beard and others from Billerica to Wilmington.

Boxford-Georgetown Line. — Defined by chapter 253 of the Acts of 1904.

Boxford-Groveland Line. — Defined by chapter 61 of the Acts of 1856.

Boxford-Haverhill Line. — This line is a part of the old line between Bradford and Rowley; it is referred to in the old Indian deed to Bradford, recorded under date of April 13, 1702, in the following language: —"so over Johnson's Pond so called to an oak tree standing at ye south easterly corner of ye Pond called Little Pond, and from thence to a run of water on ye north side of a certain hill commonly called and known by ye name of Philistine hill, and following ye Run of water till it come to ye Line of The Town of Andover." The bounds between corner 3 and the Andover line appear to have been set to mark "the run of water" therein referred to, which has practically disappeared.

Boxford-Ipswich Line. — The part south of corner 1 is described by chapter 81 of the Acts of 1846. The remainder of the line is a portion of the original line between Rowley and Ipswich and agrees substantially with the official map of 1830.

Boxford-Middleton Line. — Defined by chapter 252 of the Acts of 1904.

Boxford-North Andover Line. — This line was first established May 31, 1652, and was redefined by chapter 147 of the Acts of 1904.

Boxford-Rowley Line. — Defined by chapter 148 of the Acts of 1904.

Boxford-Topsfield Line. — From the corner of Boxford, Ipswich and Topsfield to corner 1, the line was defined by chapter 81 of the Acts of 1846; southerly from corner 1 it was described in reports of a committee accepted by the General Court, dated Feb. 25, 1701, and Nov. 19, 1707.

Burlington-Wilmington Line. — This line is a part of the original northeasterly line of Woburn, parallel with and about four miles distant from the southwesterly line; it is described as a single straight line in chapter 2, Acts of 1730, incorporating Wilmington, and again in chapter 74 of the Acts of 1798, incorporating Burlington.

Danvers-Middleton Line. — Defined by chapter 12 of the Acts of 1728 incorporating Middleton. No statute has been found definitely describing the portion of the line described as following the line between Salem and Topsfield, but the line as marked corresponds with the official map of 1830.

Dracut-Methuen Line. — This line was a part of the original "Six mile line" of Dracut, established Feb. 26, 1702, and is described in chapter 12 of the Laws of 1725, incorporating Methuen.

Groveland-Haverhill Line. — The part of this line following Merrimac river is a portion of the original southerly line of Haverhill referred to in the incorporation of Bradford (of which Groveland was a part) in 1668 as a part of Rowley "lying over against Haverhill"; the portion from corner 1 to the corner of Boxford, Groveland and Haverhill was defined by chapter 62 of the Acts of 1850, incorporating Groveland.

Haverhill-Merrimac Line. — This line was formerly the line between Amesbury and Haverhill; it is described in a surveyor's report, approved by the General Court May 12, 1675, when the bounds of Haverhill were perfected.

Haverhill-Methuen Line. — Defined by chapter 12 of the Acts of 1725.

Haverhill-North Andover Line. — This is a part of the old line between Andover and Rowley, the present bounds of which agree with the early map of Rowley.

Haverhill-Plaistow (N.H.) Line. — Defined by chapter 369 of the Acts of 1899.

Haverhill-Salem (N.H.) Line. — Defined by chapter 369 of the Acts of 1899.

Haverhill-West Newbury Line. — This is a part of the original southerly line of Haverhill, following Merrimac river.

Lawrence-Methuen Line. — The portion of the line from the corner of Andover, Lawrence and Methuen to Lawrence — Methuen 2 and towards corner 1 as far as "Londonderry turnpike," is defined by chapter 190 of the Acts of 1847, incorporating Lawrence. The remainder of the line is defined by chapter 224 of the Acts of 1854, setting off part of Methuen to Lawrence.

Lawrence-North Andover Line. — The part of the line from the corner of Lawrence, Methuen and North Andover southerly to the old corner of Lawrence, Methuen and North Andover is defined by chapter 224 of the Acts of 1854; the portion from that point southerly to corner 2 is defined by chapter 190 of the Acts of 1847, and from corner 2 to the corner of Andover, Lawrence and North Andover the line is defined by chapter 15 of the Acts of 1879, annexing part of North Andover to Lawrence.

Lynn-Lynnfield Line. — Defined by chapter 7 of the Acts of 1782, incorporating the North Parish of Lynn into the town of Lynnfield.

Lynnfield-Middleton and Lynnfield-Peabody Lines. — These lines are a part of the old boundary between Lynn and Salem, established March 13, 1639. The present corner of Lynnfield, Middleton and Peabody was established when Middleton was incorporated June 20, 1728, a portion of Salem being set off to Middleton at that time.

Lynnfield-North Reading Line. — The straight portions of this line were defined by chapter 238 of the Acts of 1857; the portion following Ipswich river is a part of the old boundary of Lynn, as shown on the early maps.

Lynnfield-Reading Line. — Defined by chapter 361 of the Acts of 1905.

Lynnfield-Saugus Line. - Defined by chapter 407 of the Acts of 1901.

Lynnfield-Wakefield Line. — The corner of Lynnfield, Saugus and Wakefield was a point on the old line between Lynnfield and Wakefield, established by chapter 407 of the Acts of 1901. The line itself was defined in a report of Commissioners dated Sept. 26, 1870, under authority of chapter 153 of the Acts of the same year.

Methuen-North Andover Line. — Defined as following Merrimac river by chapter 12 of the Laws of 1725.

Methuen-Pelham (N.H.) and Methuen-Salem (N.H.) Lines. — Defined by chapter 369 of the Acts of 1899.

Middleton-North Andover Line. — Defined by chapter 251 of the Acts of 1904.

Middleton-North Reading Line. — This line between corners 1 and 2 formed the southwesterly boundary of Governor Bellingham's farm, laid out Oct. 8, 1662, by order of the General Court; it was also a portion of the eastern boundary of a tract of land granted to the town of Reading by the General Court prior to 1666 and described in the Court Records of that year. A plan of this tract on file in the Archives gives this boundary as straight between corners 1 and 2, although the official plan of 1830 of Middleton shows numerous slight deflections from a straight line. The portion of the line from corner 3 southwesterly to Ipswich river originally formed a part of the boundary between Reading and Salem. Otherwise the line is defined by chapter 12 of the Acts of 1728, incorporating Middleton.

Middleton-Peabody Line. — Defined by chapter 12 of the Acts of 1728. The straight line portion probably formed the southern and eastern boundaries of either Ezra Putnam's or John Buxton's farms.

Middleton-Topsfield Line. — Defined by chapter 12 of the Acts of 1728. A portion of Nichols brook has been diverted and the northeasterly branch has been obliterated. At these places the location of the boundary line has been marked with granite monuments.

North Andover-North Reading Line. — Defined by chapter 149 of the Acts of 1904.

North Reading-Reading Line. — Defined by chapter 71 of the Acts of 1853.

North Reading-Wilmington Line. — Defined by chapter 2 of the Acts of 1730, incorporating Wilmington.

Reading-Stoneham Line. — This line was fixed by order of the Court April 5, 1751, confirming a report of the Committee of the towns of Stoneham and Reading, which then included Wakefield, dated June 5, 1750.

Reading-Wakefield Line. — The portion of the line from the corner of Stoneham, Reading and Wakefield to corner 3 was defined July 13, 1769, when the South precinct of Reading was divided; the remaining portion of the line was established by chapter 71 of the Acts of 1813, by which the "Eaton farms" were annexed to the Second parish of Reading.

Reading-Wilmington Line. — Defined by chapter 2 of the Acts of 1730, incorporating Wilmington.

Reading-Woburn Line. — This line is described May 29, 1644, in a report of a Committee appointed by the Court to settle the line between Wooborn and Linn Village (called Redding).

Tewksbury-Wilmington Line. — The portion of the line northeast of corner 2 was defined by chapter 2 of the Acts of 1730, and the portion northwesterly of corner 2 was established by chapter 17 of the Acts of 1734. The location of the corner of Billerica, Tewksbury and Wilmington was defined in a petition and order of the Court Dec. 27, 1737, setting off the estates of John Beard and others from Billerica to Wilmington.

Wilmington-Woburn Line. — Defined by chapter 2 of the Acts of 1730, incorporating Wilmington.

The statutes defining the present boundaries of this group of towns, the material parts of which are printed at the end of this preface, are as follows:—

1639, March 13, Massachusetts Colony Records, - line between Lynn and Peabody defined.

1639, September 9, Massachusetts Colony Records, - grant of additional land, known as "Linn Village" to Lynn.

On the line between Andover and Tewksbury, roadstones on the southeasterly side of River road*; on the northwesterly corner* of Fiske street and Bailey road; on the northerly side of Andover street,* Tewksbury, or Lowell street, Andover; on the northerly side of Vale street,* Tewksbury, or Tewksbury street, Andover; and linestone* a short distance south of the latter street.

On the line between Andover and Wilmington, linestones a short distance east of Woburn street*; and a short distance west of Ballardvale street.*

On the line between Atkinson (N.H.) and Haverhill, roadstone on the easterly side of a street* leading northerly from Crystal street.

On the line between Billerica and Wilmington, roadstones on the southeasterly side of Hopkins street; and on the northerly side of Aldrich road.

On the line between Boxford and Georgetown, roadstones on the easterly side of the road leading from South Georgetown to Topsfield; on the easterly side of the road leading from South Georgetown to Boxford; on the westerly side of Bald Pate street; at the intersection* of the road from Georgetown to North Andover with the road from Boxford to South Groveland; on the southerly side of Andover street; and linestone* north of Andover street.

On the line between Boxford and Groveland, roadstone on the westerly side of Washington street; and linestones a short distance northwesterly from Parker river; and on the easterly shore of Johnsons pond.

On the line between Boxford and Haverhill, linestones a short distance east and west of the road east of corner 1; and roadstone on the easterly side of the road west of Chadwick's pond.

On the line between Boxford and Topsfield, roadstones on the westerly side of Haverhill street*; and on the north-easterly side of Boxford street.

On the line between Burlington and Wilmington, roadstone on the southerly side of Burlington avenue.

On the line between Danvers and Middleton, roadstones on the northerly side of Nichols street, Danvers, or Ferncroft road in Middleton; and on the southwesterly side of Maple street.

On the line between Dracut and Methuen, roadstone on the northerly side of Lawrence road.

On the line between Haverhill and Merrimac, roadstones on the westerly side of an old road; on the southeasterly side of Main street; and on the westerly side of the northerly road from Rocks Village to Merrimacport.

On the line between Haverhill and Methuen, roadstones on the southerly side of Broadway; on the easterly side of Atkinson street; on the northerly side of a road leading northerly from Lowell avenue; on the northerly side of Lowell avenue, Haverhill, or Howe street, Methuen; and on the northerly side of Washington street.

On the line between Haverhill and Plaistow (N.H.), roadstones on the southerly side of Brandybrow road;* on the southerly side of Corliss Hill road;* on the westerly side of Newton road;* on the northeasterly side of Middle road;* on the easterly side of the road near the North Parish church;* and on the easterly side of Main street.*

On the line between Haverhill and Salem (N.H.), roadstone on the northeasterly side of Liberty street.*

On the line between Lawrence and Methuen, roadstone on the westerly side of East Haverhill street, Lawrence, or Merrimac street, Methuen; on the easterly side of a street a short distance east of Prospect street; on the easterly side of Prospect street; on the westerly side of Arlington street.

On the line between Lynnfield and Peabody, roadstones on the northerly side of Lowell street; on the northerly side of Essex street, Lynnfield, or Winona street, Peabody; on the westerly side of Broadway,* Lynnfield, or Newbury street, Peabody; on the westerly side of Locust street*; and on the northerly side of Salem street, Lynnfield, or Lynnfield street, Peabody.

On the line between Lynnfield and Saugus, roadstones on the easterly side of Broadway*; and on the easterly side of Walnut street.*

On the line between Lynnfield and Wakefield, roadstone on the southerly side of Pine street.

On the line between Methuen and Pelham (N.H.), roadstone on the southerly side of Pine street.*

On the line between Methuen and Salem (N.H.), roadstones on the northerly side of the road* south of Spicket hill; on the northerly side of Marle street;* on the northerly side of Pond street;* on the easterly side of Hampshire street;* on the westerly side of Broadway;* on the northerly side of Pine street;* on the easterly side of a street* leading northerly from Pine street; and on the easterly side of Mill street.*

On the line between Middleton and North Reading, roadstones on the northerly side of Forest street, Middleton, or Marblehead street, North Reading; and on the northerly side of Elm street.

On the line between North Reading and Wilmington, roadstones on the northerly side of Park street; and on the southerly side of Concord street.

On the line between Reading and Stoneham, roadstone on the westerly side of Main street.

On the line between Reading and Wakefield, roadstones at the junction* of Haverhill and Main streets with Pine street; on the westerly side of Pratt street*; on the southerly side of Salem street,* Reading, or Lowell street, Wakefield; on the northerly side of Village street, Reading, or Railroad street, Wakefield; on the southerly side of Ash street; and on the southerly side of South street.*

On the line between Reading and Wilmington, linestone south of Ipswich river; roadstones on the northerly side of Grove street; on the northerly side of Lowell street; and on the southwesterly side of West street.

On the line between Reading and Woburn, three linestones northwest of Washington street; roadstone on the northwesterly side of Washington street; linestone half way between Washington street and the corner of Reading, Stoneham and Woburn; and roadstone on the northwesterly side of Cedar street.

On the line between Tewksbury and Wilmington, roadstones on the southerly side of Salem street, Tewksbury, or Flint street, Wilmington; on the northeasterly side of Main street; and two roadstones on the northerly side of Lake street.

BOUNDS BETWEEN SALEM AND LYNN ESTABLISHED.

(DEFINING THE LYNNFIELD-PEABODY LINE.)

It is ordered that the bounds betwixt Salem and Lynn shall begin at the cliff by the sea where the water runs as the way lieth from Lynn to Marblehead, and run upon a straight line to the long pond by the old path that goeth to Lynn at the south end thereof next to Lynn, and the whole pond to be in Salem bounds, and from that pond to run upon a straight line to the island in Mr. Humphrey's pond, and from that island to run upon a straight line to six great pine trees marked, called by those six men that laid out the bounds the "Six men's bounds"; and from those trees to run upon a straight line unto another little pine tree marked, by the side of a little hill beyond the trees, to run upon the same line so far as our bounds shall reach into the country.

ADDITIONAL GRANT OF LAND TO LYNN.

The petition of the inhabitants of Linn for place for an inland plantation at the head of their bounds is granted them four mile square, as the place will afford; upon condition that the petitioners shall, within two years make some good proceeding in planting, so as it may be a village fit to contain a convenient number of inhabitants, which may in due time have a church there; and so as such as shall remove to inhabit there shall not withal keep their accommodations in Linn above two years after their removal to the said village, upon pain to forfeit their interest in one of them at their own election, except this Court shall see just cause to dispense further with them, and this village is to be four mile square at least by just content.

We, being appointed by the Court to settle the bounds Wooborne and Linn Village (called Redding) have agreed, that the line of partition between them shall begin at the little brook in Parley meadow, where it begins to turn upward toward the northeast, and so to abut upon Charleston head line, and to run north and by west into the country; the point being taken from the needle, without allowance for the variation, unto which agreement we have set our hands this 23th 3th month, 1644.

GRANT OF TWO MILES LAID OUT TO READING.

(DEFINING MIDDLETON-NORTH READING 1-2.)

Whereas, the Honorable General Court having formerly granted to the town of Reading a tract of land of two miles lying between their grant of four miles and Mr. Bellingham's farm and the great river, and has ordered them to have it laid out sometime before this Court sat, at the request of the town, this plat of land is laid out and returned, buttelled and bounded as followeth:—Running from a pine tree at A, north by a compass, six hundred rods, joins to the town of Reading land unto B, to the top of a rocky hill; and from B east two hundred and sixty-eight rods to an oak tree at c, marked (R B) and joins to Andover land, and from c, south, southeast, 8 deg 30 to E, five hundred seventy-six rods; this line joins upon the Gov-

ernor's farm, to a black oak tree at D, marked (R B), and this line joins upon Mr. Bellingham's farm; the fourth line runs from D E B N two hundred thirty-six rods to a walnut tree at E, and joins also on Mr. Bellingham's farm; the fifth line from E, southeast and by south two hundred and four rods to a black oak in Salem line at F, which line joins upon the farm of Thomas Fuller; the sixth line runs from F west southwest point by four hundred and twenty rods to a black oak at G which line is Salem bounds; the seventh line from G west by north point five hundred sixty eight rods to a pine tree at A alongst the river side.

CHAPTER 12, PROVINCE LAWS 1725.

AN ACT FOR DIVIDING THE TOWN OF HAVERHILL AND ERECTING A NEW TOWN THERE, AND IN PARTS ADJACENT, BY THE NAME OF METHUEN.

(DEFINING ANDOVER-METHUEN, DRACUT-METHUEN, HAVERHILL-METHUEN AND METHUEN-NORTH ANDOVER LINES.)

* * * That the west part of the town of Haverhill, with the lands adjoining, be and hereby are set off and constituted a separate township by the name of Methuen: the bounds of the said township to be as follows, viz., beginning at the mouth of Hawks' Meadow Brook, so called, in Merrimack River, and from thence to run, half a point to the northward of the northwest, to an heap of stones, or till it intersects Haverhill line; * * *; from thence, six miles or thereabouts, upon Dracut line, south, to Merrimack River; and from thence, to run down said river about ten miles and forty pole, till it comes to the first-mentioned bounds, * *

CHAPTER 12, ACTS OF 1728.

AN ACT FOR ERECTING THE LANDS HEREAFTER BOUNDED AND DESCRIBED INTO A TOWNSHIP BY THE NAME OF MIDDLETON.

(DEFINING THE ENTIRE BOUNDARY LINE.)

Whereas, sundry inhabitants of the towns of Salem, Topsfield, Boxford and Andover, * * * That the aforesaid lands, as hereafter bounded and described, be and hereby are set off and constituted a separate township by the name of Middleton, the bounds of the said township to be as followeth; viz: - beginning with Ipswich river where Salem southwesterly line crosseth the same, and so running downward as the river runneth till it cometh to Salem northeasterly line; and thence running as the line between Salem and Topsfield runneth to a brook commonly called Nichols brook; and then, by said brook, and the northeasterly branch thereof, to Ipswich river; † and thence up the river to a meadow called Ford meadow; and from thence on a westerly and northwesterly line to a certain black oak stump, a known ranging bound on the line between Boxford and Andover; and from said stump running to the northwesterly part of Timothy Perkins his farm in Andover; and from thence to a northwesterly corner of Bellingham's farm, so called, and on said farm to the southwesterly corner thereof; and from thence to a white oak standing between the road and Phelps' meadow, being a known bound between Salem and Reading; and so on Salem line to the river first mentioned; and that Ezra Putnam and John Buxton Sen'r, inhabitants of Salem, with their lands and estates adjoining to the said township of Middleton (who are desirous to be annexed thereto) be from henceforth reckoned and accounted as part of the said town of Middleton, and are hereby set off from Salem accordingly; * * *

CHAPTER 2, ACTS OF 1730.

AN ACT FOR ERECTING THE NORTHEASTERLY PART OF WOBURN AND WESTERLY PART OF READING INTO A TOWNSHIP BY THE NAME OF WILMINGTON.

(DEFINING THE ENTIRE BOUNDARY LINE.)

* * * Beginning at the southeasterly part of the Land of Nod, so called, so to extend to Andover line; thence to Billerica line, and so upon said line, including Abraham Jacques, his farm, and so to run from thence on Billerica line one hundred rods farther; and from thence to extend to the stone bridge, near the tree called the Figure-of-Four tree; thence on a line to the southeasterly corner of John Townsend's land, lately and now in possession of Timothy Townsend, about sixty-four rods easterly from Woburn line, including said Townsend's land; thence on a straight line to the southeast part of the land of Joel Jenkins; and from thence to extend to the first mentioned bounds. * * *

Beginning at Stoneham line at a heap of stones, at the southeasterly corner of Jonathan Weston's homestead; from thence to a white oak tree at the southwardly corner of Isaac Burnap's and Jabez Damon's pasture, called Bare Hill pasture; from thence eastwardly as the fence now stands on the southwardly side of said pasture, till it comes to the road near the stone bridge at Barehill brook, so called; from thence northwardly on the road till it comes to the northeastwardly end of the causeway at the Three Bridges, so called; from thence to the southwestwardly corner of Lieutenant Jonathan Pool's farm; from thence on the fence on the southerly side of said Pool's land till it comes to the road leading from said Pool's to the meeting-house; from thence northeast till it comes to Lynn line, excepting Thomas Eaton, Jonathan Eaton, Joshua Eaton, Thomas Eaton the Third, and Edmund Eaton, with their lands they are now respectively in possession of and their other estates, who, although included in said bounds, shall remain to the South Precinct to all intents and purposes whatsoever, as fully as if they and their lands aforesaid lay south of said line.

two degrees, forty-two minutes, five and twenty-one hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, no minutes, forty-one and twenty-two hundredths seconds; thence north eighty-eight degrees, thirty-six minutes west, true bearing, three thousand four hundred and twelve feet to a stone monument lettered B R, standing at the southwesterly corner of the town of Georgetown on the easterly side of the road between South Groveland and East Boxford, in latitude forty-two degrees, forty-two minutes, six and three hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, one minute, twenty-six and nine tenths seconds; thence north twenty-six degrees, fiftyfive minutes west, true bearing, one thousand and nine feet to a stone monument lettered B R, standing in a stone wall and about one hundred and five feet east of the house formerly owned by H. 
CHAPTER 361, ACTS OF 1905.

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH THE BOUNDARY LINE BETWEEN THE TOWNS OF LYNNFIELD AND READING.

(DEFINING THE LYNNFIELD-READING LINE.)

Beginning at the corner of the towns of Lynnfield, North Reading and Reading at a granite monument in latitude forty-two degrees, thirty-three minutes, twenty-one and forty-one hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, four minutes, seventeen and thirty-two hundredths seconds; thence south thirty-eight degrees, fifty minutes east, true bearing, two thousand nine hundred and ten feet to a granite monument in latitude forty-two degrees, thirty-two minutes, fifty-nine and two hundredths seconds, and longitude seventyone degrees, three minutes, fifty-two and ninety-four hundredths seconds; thence south eighty-eight degrees, nine minutes west, true bearing, three thousand two hundred and eighty-three feet to a granite monument in latitude forty-two degrees, thirty-two minutes, fifty-seven and ninety-seven hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, four minutes, thirty-six and seventy-seven hundredths seconds; thence south fifty-two degrees, forty-four minutes west, true bearing, one thousand, one hundred and seventy-seven feet to a granite monument in latitude forty-two degrees, thirty-two minutes, fifty and ninety-three hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, four minutes, forty-nine and twentyeight hundredths seconds; thence south twenty degrees, forty-four minutes east, true bearing, three thousand three hundred and seven feet to a granite monument in latitude forty-two degrees, thirty-two minutes, twenty and thirty-eight hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, four minutes, thirty-three and sixty-four hundredths seconds; thence south one degree, fifty-eight minutes east, true bearing, two thousand eight hundred and eighty-three feet, to a granite monument standing at the corner of the towns of Lynnfield, Reading and Wakefield, in latitude forty-two degrees, thirty-one minutes, fifty-one and ninetytwo hundredths seconds, and longitude seventy-one degrees, four minutes, thirtytwo and thirty-two hundredths seconds. * *

- Holt. Copper bolt in top of flat-topped bowlder on open summit of Prospect or Holts hill, in eastern part of Andover.
- 2. Crane Neck. Top of earthen cone 1.1 feet below ground on southerly end of summit of Crane Neck hill, in southern part of West Newbury, and 14.28 feet south 18° 22' west (true bearing) from "Crane Neck 2," a drill hole in a granite monument, marked , projecting about 0.4 of a foot.
- 3. Bald Pate Hill. Marble monument with its top broken off about 8 inches under ground, on the summit of Bald Pate hill, in the southwestern part of Georgetown, and 25.81 feet north 78° 40' east (true bearing) from a lone elm tree.
- 4. Bare Hill. Drill hole in a stone in base of wall running northwesterly over summit of Bare hill, in northern part of Methuen.
- 5. Danvers Insane Asylum. Vane rod on square brick tower of the Insane Asylum.
- 6. Ayers Hill 2. Copper bolt in triangle cut in the top of a bowlder, about 18 feet south of a wall and about 75 feet east of Massachusetts avenue, on the summit of Ayers hill, in the northern part of Haverhill.
- 7. Reading Water Tower. Apex of conical metal cap on iron water tank, on the summit of hill, about 1-3 of a mile north of the village of Reading.
- 8. Andrews Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument on summit of Andrews hill, near the line between Boxford and North Andover. It is 3.5 feet west of a wall running northwesterly over the hill.
- 9. Silver Hill Tower Flagstaff. Center of flagstaff (now gone) on square brick tower on summit of Tiltons hill, in the southwestern part of Haverhill.
- 10. Brake Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument, marked wass., on bare summit of Brake hill, in the western part of West Newbury.
- on the summit of Mills hill, about 1-2 mile south of North Andover village.
 - 12. Wills Hill. Station mark destroyed in building reservoir.
- 13. Billerica Unitarian Church. Vane rod surmounting tall, slim spire, with clock faces, on wooden church in Billerica Centre.
- 14. West Andover Congregational Church. Vane rod on tall, octagonal spire of stone church, in the center of West Andover village.
- 15. Cages Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument, marked MASS., on summit of a bare hill in the northwestern part of Boxford, about 800 v.s. feet northwesterly from the road leading from North Andover depot to Groveland.
- 16. Haverhill Powder House. Vane rod on conical brick cap of brick tower on Golden hill, in the southeastern part of Haverhill.
- 17. Spicket 2. Drill hole in bowlder on the highest point of Spicket hill, in Salem, N. H., a little northwest of the State line and 9.91 feet south 47° 41' east (true bearing) from a drill hole in a slightly larger rock.
- 18. Centennial Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument, marked on the summit of Centennial hill, about 1-2 of a mile south of the village of U.'s.

 Groveland.
- 19. Bear Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument, marked wass., on summit of Bear Hill, in the central part of Groveland.
- 20. Isley. Drill hole in white marble monument, marked southerly summit of Illsleys hill, about 900 feet north of the gives, junction of Brickett and Ash streets, in the southern part of West Newbury.
- 21. Andover South Congregational Church. Vane rod with gilt ball on tall, slim spire, with clock faces, on wooden church, near the junction of Central and School streets, in the village of Andover.
- 22. Andover Seminary Chapel. Vane rod on low spire on stone building on high land belonging to Phillips Academy, on the southerly side of Chapel street near Main street, in the village of Andover.
- 23. Flag Pole Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument set flush and marked MASS., on a conspicuous hill in the eastern part of Burlington, about 1,000 feet west u.s. of Winter street, Woburn.
- 24. Wakefield Baptist Church. Vane rod on tall, octagonal spire of wooden church, at junction of Lafayette and Main streets, in the village of Wakefield.
- 25. Fox Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument set flush and marked MASS., on the southeastern slope of Fox hill, Billerica, on the northerly side of a large, lone pine tree.
- 26. Williams Cupola. Vane rod at center of square wooden cupola on barn belonging to the Williams estate, on the summit of Meeting House hill, in the southwestern part of Methuen.
- 27. Lawrence School House Tower. Copper finial on square brick tower, with clock faces, on the John R. Rollins school, a two-story brick building at the intersection of Howard and Platt streets, in the northeastern part of Lawrence.
- 28. Powderhouse Hill. Drill hole in marble monument, marked MASS., on the summit of a small bare hill, about 200 feet west of Prospect street, in u.s. the eastern part of Methuen.
- 29. Russells Hill. Drill hole in marble monument, marked MASS., on the summit of Lone Tree hill, about 800 feet south of the old ferry road, v. s. in the eastern part of Methuen.

- 30. Emery's Cupola. Base of wooden finial on square cupola on wooden barn on the summit of a hill on the "Emery farm," now owned by C. L. Saunders, and at the western end of Lowell street, in the western part of Lawrence.
- 31. Kimball. Drill hole in white marble monument with its top marked on the highest point of the southeastern summit of Kimballs hill, in the eastern part of Haverhill.
- 32. Turnpike. Drill hole in bowlder on the southwesterly summit of two prominent bare peaks, about 550 feet westerly from the Boston and Newburyport turnpike, in the southern part of Topsfield.
- 33. Peirce's Tower. Center of flagstaff, at apex of wooden observatory, on the westerly slope of a hill, a short distance west of T. W. Peirce's dwelling, on Boston street, in the southern part of Topsfield.
- 34. **Coulds Hill.** Drill hole in bowlder in open pasture on summit of Goulds hill, in the eastern part of Middleton.
- 35. Bear Hill. Drill hole in sunken bowlder on summit of a bare hill, a short distance southwesterly from the junction of West and Haverhill streets, in the northwestern part of Topsfield.
- 36. Almshouse Water Tower. Center of metal ventilator on circular steel tank on the summit of low hill south of the buildings on the State Almshouse grounds, in the eastern part of Tewksbury.
- 37. Hoods Cupola. Center of octagonal cupola, on 2 1-2 story wooden dwelling-house on the "Hood Farm," near the junction of River road and Fiske street, in the western part of Andover.
- 38. Wilmington Congregational Church. Vane rod on slated, octagonal spire, with clock faces, on wooden church near the junction of Middlesex avenue with Glen road, in the center of the village of Wilmington.
- 39. Wilmington Flagstaff. Center of topmast of flag pole on the "Green" between Middlesex avenue and Church street, in the center of Wilmington village.
- 40. Pauls Barn Cupola. Vane rod on cupola of barn of W. F. Paul, on high land, at the intersection of Main and South streets, in the southern part of Reading.
 - 41. Dead Hill. Station mark destroyed.
- 42. Middleton Congregational Church. Tip of octagonal spire on wooden church, on the northerly side of Maple street, in the village of Middleton.
- 43. **Springs Tower.** Wooden cross on square stone tower of St. John Normal College, a three-story, stone building near the junction of Summer and Spring streets, in the northern part of Danvers.
- 44. Georgetown First Congregational Church. Center of brick tower, with clock faces, on brick church on the westerly side of Main street, Georgetown.
- 45. Ward Hill Hotel Cupola. Center of flagstaff at apex of roof of square cupola on 3 1-2 story wooden hotel, on the summit of Ward hill, in the western part of Haverhill.
- 46. Nichols Castle. Center of largest tower of "Nichols Castle," a granite dwelling on summit of a hill lying directly north of lake Saltonstall, in Haverhill.
- 47. Ward Hill. Drill hole in white marble monument, marked MASS., on the northern slope of Ward hill, about 375 feet northerly from the northern of the hotel.
- 48. West Newbury Second Congregational Church. Center of Gothic tower, with clock faces, on wooden church, on high land at the corner of Main and Church streets, in the northwestern part of West Newbury.
- 49. South Croveland Episcopal Church. Gilt cross on spire of wooden church on the westerly side of Washington street, in the village of South Groveland.
- 50. Stevens 2. Drill hole in marble monument, marked wass, on the summit of Long hill, in the northern part of West Newbury.
- 51. Orne. Drill hole in the highest part of a huge ledge on highest summit of a series of wooded hills, near quarry, about 3-4 of a mile northwest of Boston street, in the town of Peabody. There is an iron bolt about 12 inches east of the drill hole.
- 52. Club Rock. Drill hole in top of smooth ledge on the northwestern slope of a wooded hill, about 1-3 of a mile southwest of the village of South Lynnfield and 15.75 feet southwesterly from the northwesterly corner of a building used as a club house.
- 53. **Tophet Hill.** Drill hole in bowlder on southwesterly side of an open field near the summit of Tophet hill, in the northwestern part of Lynnfield. It is 44 feet northeast of one wall and 75 feet southwest of another wall.
- 54. North Reading Universalist Church. Vane rod on center of octagonal dome-shaped cap on tower of wooden church, now used as a school, on the Common, in the village of North Reading.
- 55. North Reading Flagstaff. Center of tall, double staff, near the North Reading Universalist church described above. This staff was erected in 1894.
- 56. Town Hillside. Drill hole in top of flat rock on easterly slope of Town hill, in the central part of the town of Topsfield.
- 57. Hillside. Drill hole in small rock on the northeasterly slope of Putnams hill, north of the village of Putnamville, in the northern part of Danvers.

- 58. **Creat Bend.** Drill hole in top of rock a few feet north of the highest point of a hill, about 1-2 of a mile northerly from the junction of Goodale and Russell streets with Lowell street, in the northwestern part of Peabody.
- 59. Long Hill. Drill hole in marble monument, marked wass, near the western edge of the summit of Long hill, in the eastern part of u. s. Georgetown.
- 60. Hughes. Drill hole in marble monument, marked mass, a few feet north of and slightly below the summit of a hill in the southern part of Merrimac, about 1-2 of a mile west of the village of Merrimacport.
- 61. Fosters Pond. Drill hole in bowlder on the eastern slope of a wooded hill, in the extreme northern part of Wilmington. It is about 1,500 feet southerly from the junction of Rattlesnake Hill road with Woburn street, in Andover.
- 62. Junction. Drill hole in the most northerly bowlder on the southeasterly slope of a wooded knoll southwest of the Andover-Tewksbury town line, and about 1,200 feet southwesterly from the Tewksbury Street bridge over the Lowell Branch of the Boston & Maine Railroad.
- 63. Alder. Drill hole in flat rock, in cultivated land surrounded by alders, on summit of a low hill, about 350 feet northeasterly from the junction of Exchange street with Lawrence street, in the northern part of Lawrence.
- 64. Kidder. Drill hole in huge ledge rising from the northeastern shore of Walden pond, in the northern part of Lynn.
- 65. Pope. Drill hole in rock in open pasture on the southerly slope of a low hill, 6 feet south of a wall and about 450 feet southwest of Summer street, in the central part of Lynnfield.
 - 66. Sanborns Hill. Station mark destroyed.
- 67. Mow. Drill hole in bowlder on the northerly slope of hill, 20 feet west of a wall between mowing and woodland, and about 225 feet northeasterly from a point on Chestnut street, North Reading, or Lowell street, Lynnfield, 800 feet easterly from the junction of Park street with Chestnut street, in the southeasterly part of North Reading.
- 68. Rock Raymond. Drill hole in outcrop of ledge on summit of hill which rises abruptly from the northern side of Chestnut street, in the northwestern part of Lynnfield.
- 69. Party. Drill hole in rock about 75 feet south of the highest point of an outcrop of ledge, at summit of hill, about 1-4 of a mile northwesterly from the northerly end of Grove street, in the village of South Lynnfield.

- 70. Montreal. Iron pipe driven into the ground a few feet west of summit of a small, bare mound, about 250 feet northwest of John H. Howard's dwelling and 185 feet east of Martin Hayward's dwelling, both being on the northerly side of Elm street, in the southwestern part of Middleton.
- 71. Slope. Drill hole in flat rock in open pasture on the eastern slope of Goulds hill, about 375 feet westerly from a point on East street, about 1,850 feet northwesterly from its junction with Locust street, in the eastern part of Middleton.

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DESCRIPTION OF CITY AND TOWN CORNERS.

CORNER OF
ANDOVER-DRACUT-METHUEN AND W.M.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 14.)

LOCATION. — The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Merrimac river, south 10° 37' east (true bearing) and 500 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands 100 feet northwesterly from the northwestern shore of the river.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough bowlder 2.2 feet high and averaging about 9 x 14 inches in section. The letter D is cut on the west face, and M on the east face.

ANDOVER - DRACUT - TEWKSBURY AND W.M.

LOCATION. — The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Merrimac river, north 56° 59' west (true bearing) and about 400 feet distant from the witness mark standing about 20 feet south of the southerly bank of the river.

MARK.—The witness mark is a dressed granite monument 4 feet high and 12 inches square. The letter A is cut on the northeast face, T on the southwest face, and 1903 on the northwest face.

CORNER OF
ANDOVER-LAWRENCE-METHUEN AND W.M.'S.

Location.—The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Merrimac river, north 7° 59' west (true bearing) and about 650 feet distant from the south witness mark, standing in open pasture, about 40 feet southwesterly from the southwestern bank of the canal which runs parallel with the southerly shore of the river. The corner is south 7° 40' east (true bearing) and about 750 feet distant from the north witness mark, which stands on the southerly slope of a hill, about 200 feet northeasterly from the northeastern shore of the river.

MARK. — The north witness mark is a rough granite monument 3.6 feet high and averaging about 6 x 10 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the east face, and M on the west face.

The south witness mark is a granite monument 3.6 feet high and averaging about 8 inches square. The letter A is cut on the west face, and L on the east face.

ANDOVER-LAWRENCE 1.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 14.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in a garden, 200 feet southwesterly from the intersection of Chickering street with the Boston & Maine railroad.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.5 feet high and about 8 x 12 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the south face, and L on the north face.

ANDOVER-LAWRENCE 2.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 14.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on the southeasterly corner of North and Mount Vernon streets, opposite Greenwood road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.3 feet high and about 6 x 8 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the west face, and L on the east face.

ANDOVER-LAWRENCE-NORTH ANDOVER.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 14.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on the westerly side of High street, Andover, or Railroad street, North Andover, at a point about 1,000 feet southerly from its intersection with Salem turnpike.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.8 feet high and about 6 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the southwest face, L on the northwest face, and N_0 on the northeast face.

ANDOVER-NORTH ANDOVER 1.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in a cultivated field, 225 feet southwesterly from the intersection of Peters street with Salem turnpike, in North Andover.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.1 feet high and about 7 x 10 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the west face, and $^{No.}$ on the east face.

CORNER OF ANDOVER-NORTH ANDOVER-NORTH READING.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, on the summit of Osgood's hill, 153 feet easterly from the northeast corner of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.7 feet high and about 6 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the north face, and R on the south face.

CORNER OF ANDOVER-NORTH READING-WILMINGTON.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, in a wall, at a point 35 feet from its eastern end.

MARK.—The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2.2 feet high and about 8 x 10 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the east face, R on the south face, and w on the north face.

ANDOVER-TEWKSBURY I AND W.M.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 14.)

LOCATION. — The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Shawsheen river, north 49° 57' west (true bearing) and about 320 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands in open meadow, on the southerly side of the river.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough granite monument 1.5 feet high and about 7 x 11 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the east face, and T on the west face.

ANDOVER-TEWKSBURY 2 AND W.M.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 14.)

LOCATION. — The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Shawsheen river, south 56° 56′ east (true bearing)

and about 150 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands in woodland, about 100 feet north of the bank of the river.

Mark. — The witness mark is a dressed granite monument 4 feet high and 12 inches square. The letter A is cut on the east face, T on the west face, and 1903 on the south face.

ANDOVER - TEWKSBURY - WILMINGTON.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in a partly grown over pasture, about 100 feet easterly from the wall on the easterly side of the Boston & Maine railroad.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.9 feet high and about 6 x 8 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the north face, T on the west face, and w on the east face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 1.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on the northerly slope of a wooded hill.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.5 feet high and about 6 x 7 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the northeast face, and w on the southwest face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 2.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated against the southerly side of the western end of a wall, and on the southeasterly side of a wood-road:

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.7 feet high and about 6 x 8 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the northeast face, and w on the southwest face.

ANDOVER - WILMINGTON 3.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, on the westerly side of Woburn street, at a point 1,050 feet southerly from its junction with Rattlesnake Hill road, in Andover.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.6 feet high and about 6 x 7 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the east face, and w on the west face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 4.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on high, wooded land, 20 feet east of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3 feet high, 8 inches square, and broken down to corners. The letter A is cut on the east face, and w on the west face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 5.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.)

Location. — The corner is situated on the southerly slope of a wooded knoll, about 150 feet westerly from a junction of wood-roads.



ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 6.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on the northerly brow of a wooded hill, 275 feet southeasterly from the junction of River street with Junction road, in Andover.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument, triangular in section, 4 feet high, and averaging about 10 x 14 x 7 inches in section.



ANDOVER - WILMINGTON 7. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 18.)

Location. — The corner is situated on the northwesterly brow of a wooded hill, about 500 feet southwesterly from the junction of River street with Junction road, in Andover.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 8 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the north face, and w on the south face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 8.

Location. — The corner is situated on the easterly side of Ballardvale street, called River street in Andover, at a point 1,400 feet southwesterly from its junction with Junction road, in Andover.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 7 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the northwest face, and w on the southeast face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 9. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 18.)

Location. — The corner is situated 5.5 feet east of the wall on the westerly side of Ballardvale street.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.5 feet high and about 8 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the west face, and w on the east face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 10.

Location. — The corner is situated in an orchard, 9 feet west of the wall on the westerly side of Ballardvale street.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.5 feet high and about 8 inches square. The letter A is cut on the west face, and w on the east face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 11.

Location. — The corner is situated in cultivated land, 11 feet westerly from the wall on the westerly side of Ballardvale street.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.1 feet high and about 8 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the northwest face, and w on the southeast face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 12.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 18.) LOCATION. - The corner is situated in low, cultivated land, about 300 feet easterly from the center of the Boston & Maine railroad tracks.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.6 feet high and about 7 x 9 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the northwest face, and w on the southeast face.

ANDOVER-WILMINGTON 13. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 18.)

Location. — The corner is situated in cultivated land, 129 feet southwesterly from Andover-Wilmington 12.

MARK. - The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.9 feet high and about 8 x 11 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the northwest face, and w on the southeast face.

ATKINSON (N.H.) - HAVERHILL 1.

Location. — The corner is situated in a partly grown over pasture, about 950 feet southerly from George A. Sawyer's house.

Mark. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.3 feet high and 16 inches square. The letters MASS are cut on the south face, and NH on the north face.

ATKINSON (N.H.) - HAVERHILL 2.

Location. — The corner is situated 2 feet east of the wall on the westerly side of North Broadway, about 430 feet northerly from its junction with Crystal street, in Haverhill.

MARK. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.5 feet high and 15 x 16 inches in section. The letters NH are cut on the north face, and MASS on the south face.

ATKINSON (N.H.) - HAVERHILL - PLAISTOW (N.H.). (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.)

LOCATION. — The corner is situated 2 feet west of the wall on the easterly side of Hilldale avenue, about 375 feet southerly from its junction with Main street, in Atkinson.

MARK. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 5.3 feet high and 14 inches square. The letters MASS are cut on the southwesterly face, and PA on the northeasterly face.

ATKINSON (N.H.) - HAVERHILL - SALEM (N.H.).

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.) Location. — The corner is situated on the northerly slope of a wooded knoll, about 60 feet southerly from the intersection of a wood-road with a wall.

Mark. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.8 feet high and 16 inches square. The letters are cut on the southeast face, and AS on the northwest face.

CORNER OF BILLERICA-BURLINGTON-WILMINGTON.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 16.) Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Lubbers brook, north 25° 09' east (true bearing) and about 10 feet distant from the witness mark standing 4 feet westerly from the westerly bank of the brook, in a swamp covered with a thick growth of bushes and trees.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 4 feet high and averaging 6 x 8 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the south face, B on the west face, and w on the east face.

BILLERICA - TEWKSBURY - WILMINGTON AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Shawsheen river, north 57° 27' west (true bearing) and about 30 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands 3 feet easterly from the east bank of the river, 39 feet northeasterly from the center of the bridge at the junction of Nichols avenue with Brown street.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough granite monument 3.5 feet high and about 8 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the north face, T on the east face, and w on the south face.

BILLERICA - WILMINGTON 1 AND W.M.


Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Shawsheen river, north 38° 35' west (true bearing) and about 70 feet distant from the witness mark standing on a slight elevation in an open meadow, about 35 feet south of the bank of the river, and 4 feet west of an elm tree.

BILLERICA-WILMINGTON 2.

MARK. - The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 8 inches square. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and w on the northeast face.

Location. — The corner is situated at an angle, in a narrow strip of woods, on the southerly side of a cultivated field.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.7 feet high and about 8 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the west face, and w on the east face.

BILLERICA-WILMINGTON 5.

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, at the northwestern end of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.8 feet high and about 7 x 8 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and w on the northeast face.

BILLERICA - WILMINGTON 6.

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, at the northern end of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.1 feet high and 6 x 11 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the west face, and w on the east face.

BILLERICA-WILMINGTON 7.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, at the westerly side of an angle in a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4 feet high and about 6 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the west face, and w on the east face.

BILLERICA - WILMINGTON 8.

Location. — The corner is situated at the westerly edge of woodland, about 200 feet south of a street known as Aldrich road in Wilmington.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4 feet high and about 9 x 12 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the northwest face, and w on the southeast face.

BILLERICA-WILMINGTON 9 AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Lubbers brook, south 39° 29' west (true bearing) and about 5 feet distant from the witness mark standing on low, partly open meadow on the northerly bank of the brook.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 3.4 feet high and about 6 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and w on the northeast face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 1.

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, 40 feet north of the northerly edge of an open meadow and 8 feet south of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.9 feet high and about 8 inches square. The letter G is cut on the north face, and B on the southwest face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 2.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 20.)

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, on the western slope of a hill, about 300 feet north of Bald Pate pond, and about 220 feet southwesterly from a junction of walls.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.1 feet high and about 7 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and R on the northeast face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 3. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 20.)

Location. — The corner is situated in cultivated land at a point 750 feet southeasterly from the junction of Bald Pate street and Nelson street in Georgetown.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.4 feet high and about 8 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and R on the northeast face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 4.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 20.)

Location. — The corner is situated in open pasture, on the southeasterly slope of Bald Pate hill, 20 feet southwesterly from an angle in a wall at the southern corner of an orchard.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 7 x 11 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the south face, and R on the north face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 5.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated 3 feet southwesterly from a junction of walls on the northeasterly side of the road leading from Boxford to South Groveland, at a point 550 feet southerly from its intersection with the road leading from North Andover to Georgetown.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 10 inches square. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and R on the northeast face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 6.

Location. — The corner is situated at the western edge of woodland, 2 feet easterly from a retaining wall and 105 feet easterly from the southeast corner of a dwelling-house.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.3 feet high and about 6 inches square. The letter B is cut on the west face, and R on the east face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN 7.


LOCATION. - The corner is situated in woodland, on the eastern slope of a hill, about 30 feet west of the westerly edge of a wooded swamp and about 200 feet northerly from the northwest corner of a dwelling-house.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.7 feet high and about 7 x 10 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and R on the northeast face.

BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN-GROVELAND.

LOCATION. - The corner is situated 1.5 feet north of the northwestern corner of a wall and 33 feet south of the center of the traveled way of Pine Plains road, at a point about 1,300 feet southwesterly from its junction with West street in Groveland.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.2 feet high and about 10 x 12 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the west face, and R on the east face.



CORNER OF BOXFORD-GEORGETOWN-ROWLEY.

Location. — The corner, formerly known as "the Three Sisters," is situated in woodland, one foot northeasterly from the northeastern face of a bowlder 3.6 feet high and about 5 1-2 x 6 1-2 feet in section, which stands at the junction of four walls.

MARK.—The corner mark is a granite monument 3.8 feet high and about 6 inches square. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, G on the northwest face, and R on the southeast face.

BOXFORD-GROVELAND-HAVERHILL.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated 7 feet southeasterly from the wall on the northwesterly side of Centre street, Groveland, about one mile southwesterly from its intersection with Salem street in Groveland.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument about 7 feet long and about 8 inches square. The stone lies in the water and is marked B B G.

BOXFORD-HAVERHILL I.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated 2 feet northerly of an angle in a wall, dividing woodland north from cultivated land south.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 9 inches square. The letter B is cut on the northeast face, and B on the southwest face.

BOXFORD-HAVERHILL 2.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on the northerly side of the road skirting the southerly shore of Chadwicks pond, at a point 1,850 feet southwesterly from its intersection with a road leading northerly.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2.4 feet high and about 7 x 9 inches in section, and is unmarked.

BOXFORD-HAVERHILL 3.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated at the northeasterly corner of a wall, at the high-water line of Chadwicks pond.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.5 feet high and about 7 x 8 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the north face, and B on the south face.

BOXFORD-HAVERHILL 4.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated 3 feet southwest of a wall, at a point 9 feet from its southeastern end, on the westerly shore of Days Mill pond.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.3 feet high and about 7 x 8 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the southwest face, and B on the northeast face.

BOXFORD-HAVERHILL 5.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated on the northerly side of an angle in a wall dividing woodland north from cultivated land south.



BOXFORD-TOPSFIELD 1.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in cultivated land, 55 feet southeast of a wall and 505 feet northwesterly from the roadstone standing on the westerly side of Haverhill street.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3.7 feet high and about 8 x 10 inches in section. The letters are cut on the north face, and ToP on the south face.

BOXFORD-TOPSFIELD 2.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in open land, 3 feet west of a wall, at the southern end of a gate.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.8 feet high and about 11 inches square. The letter B is cut on the west face, and T on the east face.

BOXFORD-TOPSFIELD 3.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated 5 feet northwesterly from the center of the northern end of a culvert under an old road, and about 130 feet north of Mill street.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 8 x 12 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the northwest face, and T on the southeast face.

BOXFORD-TOPSFIELD 4 AND W.M.

LOCATION. — The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Fish brook, opposite the mouth of a small stream and 30 feet southwesterly from the witness mark, standing in open meadow, about 450 feet south of Mill street.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough granite monument 3.8 feet high and about 8 x 12 inches in section. The letter B is cut on the northwest face, and T on the southeast face.

BOXFORD-TOPSFIELD 5.

LOCATION. — The corner is an unmarked point in the middle of Ipswich river, opposite the mouth of Fish brook.

CORNER OF BURLINGTON – WILMINGTON – WOBURN.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated at the dam across the outlet of Cummings Mill pond, on the southwesterly side of Winter street, at a point about 750 feet northwesterly from its junction with Mountain street in Woburn.

MARK.—The corner mark is a three-sided granite monument 6.5 feet high and 13 x 13 x 11 1-2 inches in section. The stone is bound by iron bolts to a flat rock on which it rests. The letter B is cut on the west face, Wi on the northeast face, and Wo on the southeast face.



GROVELAND - HAVERHILL - WEST NEWBURY AND W.M. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 24.)



LOCATION. — The corner is situated 5 feet westerly from a junction of walls, 80 feet south of a point on Lynnfield street, 1,675 feet southeasterly from its junction with Salem street, in Lynnfield.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2.2 feet high and about 12 x 15 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the southeast face, and LD on the northwest face.

LYNN-LYNNFIELD 3.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, 2.5 feet southwesterly from an angle in a wall and 13 feet northerly from the center of a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4 feet high and about 10 inches square. The letter L is cut on the southwest face, and LD on the northeast face.

LYNN-LYNNFIELD 4.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 26.)

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, at the easterly end of a wall, about 60 feet northeasterly from a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2.2 feet high and about 10 x 12 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the south face, and LD on the north face.

LYNN-LYNNFIELD 5.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 26.)

Location. — The corner is situated on a wooded hill, 4 feet southwest of an angle in a wall and about 225 feet south of a road to the quarry.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2 feet high and about 10 x 14 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the west face, and LD on the east face.

LYNN-LYNNFIELD 6.

Location. — The corner is situated on a wooded hill, 3 feet southwesterly from the center of a wall and 43 feet northwest of Lynn - Lynnfield 5.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2 feet high and about 11 x 12 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the south face, and LD on the north face.

LYNN-LYNNFIELD-PEABODY.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 26.)



LYNNFIELD-MIDDLETON-PEABODY.

Location. — The corner is situated on the northerly slope of a wooded hill, 75 feet northerly from the roadstone in the line between Lynnfield and Peabody standing on the northerly side of Main street, Lynnfield, called Boston street in Middleton, at a point 1,980 feet southwesterly from the South Middleton railroad station.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 1.7 feet high and about 9 x 11 inches in section. The letter D is cut on the south face, M on the north face, and L on the west face.

LYNNFIELD-NORTH READING 1 AND W.M.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in the middle of Ipswich river, north 25° 46' east (true bearing) and about 20 feet distant from the witness mark standing 6 feet south of the bank of the river, in open meadow.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough granite monument 3.6 feet high and about 9 x 11 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the southeast face, and R on the northwest face.

LYNNFIELD-NORTH READING 2.

Location. — The corner is situated 3.5 feet westerly from the center of a wall and 18 feet southeasterly from the easterly corner of Sarah B. Bartlett's dwelling, which stands on the easterly side of Chestnut street, about 800 feet easterly from its junction with Park street, in North Reading.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 8 x 12 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the southeast face, and R on the northwest face.

CORNER OF LYNNFIELD - NORTH READING - READING.

Location. — The corner is situated 3 feet south of the southerly corner of a fence, at the northerly side of a small pond hole, at the eastern edge of a wooded swamp.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough dressed granite monument 4.5 feet high and about 7 x 9 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the west face, and NR on the east face.

LYNNFIELD-PEABODY I.

Location. — The corner, formerly known as "the Seven Men's Bounds," is situated on the summit of a wooded hill, about 500 feet south of Lowell street, at a point about 3,125 feet easterly from its intersection with Main street in Lynnfield.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 1.4 feet high and about 9 inches square. The letter D is cut on the east face, and L on the west face.

LYNNFIELD-PEABODY 2 AND W.M'S.

Location. — The corner is situated in Suntaug lake, south 34° 35' east (true bearing) and 1,586 feet distant from the north witness mark, and north 50° 26' west (true bearing) and 1,802 feet distant from the south witness mark. LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, 20 feet southeasterly from a swamp and 20 feet northeasterly from the center of a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.6 feet high and 10 inches square. The letter L is cut on the south face, and R on the north face.

LYNNFIELD-READING 3.

LOCATION. - The corner is situated in an open space in woods, at the easterly edge of a swamp and on the southerly side of a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.2 feet high and 10 inches square. The letter R is cut on the northwest face, and L on the southeast face.

LYNNFIELD-READING 4.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 28.)



CORNER OF LYNNFIELD-SAUGUS-WAKEFIELD AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Saugus river, north 78° 50' west (true bearing) and about 12 feet distant from the witness mark standing in cultivated land, 8 feet east of the easterly bank of the river.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 4 feet high and 9 x 10 inches in section. The letter L is cut on the north face, w on the west face, and WM on the east face.

LYNNFIELD-WAKEFIELD I AND W.M.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in the middle of

Saugus river, south 80° 15' west (true bearing) and about 12 feet distant from the witness mark standing in open meadow, 5 feet east of the easterly bank of the river.

MARK. — The witness mark is a cedar post 6 inches in diameter and one foot high, an iron ring encircling it at its top; it is unmarked.

LYNNFIELD-WAKEFIELD 2 AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Saugus river, south 80° 15' west (true bearing) and about 7 feet distant from the witness mark standing in open meadow, on the northerly bank of the river, 28 feet easterly from the center of the Boston & Maine Railroad bridge.

Mark. — The witness mark is a cedar post 6 inches in diameter and 4.5 feet high, an iron ring encircling it 9 inches below its top; it is unmarked.

LYNNFIELD-WAKEFIELD 3.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 26.) Location. — The corner is situated in the bed of Saugus river, about 470 feet westerly from its intersection with Main street, Lynnfield, or Vernon street, Wakefield.

MARK. — The corner mark is a one-inch iron pin set flush into the top of a bowlder, about 2 x 1 1-2 feet in section at its base.

LYNNFIELD-WAKEFIELD 4.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 26.) Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, 35 feet north of the northerly edge of an open meadow, about 775 feet southwesterly from the junction of Pine and Main streets, in Lynnfield.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 1.5 feet high and about 11 x 12 inches in section; it is unmarked.

CORNER OF METHUEN-PELHAM (N.H.)-SALEM (N.H.).

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 26.) Location. — The corner is situated in open pasture, on the southwesterly slope of a hill, about 60 feet south of a junction of walls.

MARK. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.6 feet high and 16 inches square. The letters MASS are cut on the southeast face, and SAP on the northwest face.

METHUEN-SALEM (N.H.) I.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 24.) Location. — The corner is situated in a cultivated field, 550 feet southerly from the junction of Hampstead street with Broadway, in Salem, N.H.

MARK. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.7 feet high and 16 inches square. The letters MASS 1890 are cut on the southeast face, s on the northwest face, and M on the northeast face.

METHUEN-SALEM (N.H.) 2.

Location. — The corner is situated in low, swampy land, 25 feet west of a wall and on the easterly side of a farm road.

MARK. - The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.3 feet high and about 16 inches square. The letters MASS are cut on the south face, NH on the north face, and STRONGWATER M on the east face.

METHUEN-SALEM (N.H.) 3.

Location. — The corner is situated in a partly wooded swamp, 230 feet easterly from a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 5 feet high and 15 x 16 inches in section. The letters MASS are cut on the south face, and NH on the north face.

METHUEN-SALEM (N.H.) 4.

Location. — The corner is situated on a knoll, in open pasture, on the easterly slope of a hill.

MARK. — The corner mark is a dressed granite monument 4.7 feet high and about 16 inches square. The letters MASS are cut on the south face, and NH on the north face.

MIDDLETON-NORTH ANDOVER I.

Location. - The corner is situated on the summit of a wooded knoll, about 30 feet northeasterly from an angle in a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.4 feet high and about 7 x 12 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the west face, and M on the east face.

CORNER OF MIDDLETON-NORTH ANDOVER-NORTH READING.

Location. — The corner is situated at a junction of walls, on the southerly slope of a wooded hill, 70 feet north of an open meadow.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 5.2 feet high and about 7 x 11 inches in section. The letter A is cut on the north face, M on the east face, and R on the west face.

MIDDLETON-NORTH READING 1.

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, at an angle in a wall, about 700 feet northerly from the junction of Marblehead street with Middleton street, in North Reading.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.1 feet high and about 7 x 11 inches in section. The letter M is cut on the east face, and R on the west face.

MIDDLETON-NORTH READING 2.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 30.)


Location. — The corner is situated on the summit of a wooded knoll, at an angle in a wall, 150 feet southeasterly from its northern end.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 10 x 12 inches in section. The letter M is cut on the east face, and R on the west face.

MIDDLETON-NORTH READING 3.

Location. — The corner is situated in open pasture, 6 feet north of a wall, on the northerly side of Flint street, opposite its junction with Boston street, in Middleton.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.4 feet high and about 9 x 10 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the northwest face, and M on the southeast face.



MIDDLETON-PEABODY I AND W.M.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in the middle of Ipswich river, north 4° 19' east (true bearing) and about 20 feet distant from the witness mark standing 7 feet south of the southerly bank of the river, 115 feet west of the Boston street bridge.

MARK. — The witness mark is a dressed granite monument 3.8 feet high and 10 inches square. The letter M is cut on the west face, and P on the east face.

MIDDLETON-PEABODY 2.

Location. — The corner is situated on the northerly slope of a wooded hill, against the southerly side of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 2.8 feet high and about 7 x 10 inches in section. The letter D is cut on the east face, and M on the west face.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 1.

Location. — The corner is situated in open meadow, about 100 feet southeasterly from a bend in Ipswich river.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 7 inches square, sunk into the meadow, and is unmarked.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 2.

Location. — The corner is situated on the westerly bank of a ditch, in an open space in partly wooded meadow, about 50 feet south of the southerly edge of upland.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3.4 feet high and 7 inches square, and is unmarked.

MIDDLETON - TOPSFIELD 3.

Location. — The corner is situated in open meadow, in a clump of bushes and willows, 100 feet westerly from the northwestern end of wooded upland and 200 feet northeast of the northeastern end of another section of wooded upland.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3.5 feet high and 7 inches square, and is unmarked.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 4 AND W.M. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 22.)

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Nichols brook, south 67° 40' west (true bearing) and about 10 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands 10 feet southeast of a clump of alders, in open meadow, 6 feet east of the bank of the brook.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 3.4 feet high and 8 inches square. The letter m is cut on the north face, and T on the south face.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 5 AND W.M. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 28.)

LOCATION. - The corner is situated in the middle of Nichols brook, north 19° 13' east (true bearing) and about 5 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands in open meadow, on the westerly bank of the brook, at the junction of a ditch.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 2 feet high, 8 inches square, and is unmarked.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 6. (FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 28.)

Location. — The corner is situated in open meadow, 600 feet easterly from a bend in East street, at a point about 850 feet northerly from its junction with Locust street, in Middleton.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3 feet high, 8 inches square, and is unmarked.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 7.

Location. — The corner is situated in partly open meadow, at the southern edge of a growth of alders, about 875 feet east of the junction of East and Locust streets, in Middleton.

MARK. - The corner mark is a granite monument 4 feet high, 7 inches square, and is unmarked.

MIDDLETON-TOPSFIELD 8 AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Nichols brook, south 78° 31' east (true bearing) and about 5 feet distant from the witness mark, which stands in a partly open meadow, on the westerly bank of the brook and 168 feet easterly from Middleton - Topsfield 7.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 2 feet high, 7 1-2 inches square, and is unmarked.

NORTH READING-READING 1.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 28.)

Location. — The corner is situated in a wooded swamp, on the southerly bank of a brook or ditch.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3.6 feet high and about 7 1-2 x 9 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the south face, and N R on the north face.

NORTH READING - READING 2.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 28.)

Location. — The corner is situated on the southeasterly side of Haverhill street, at a point 375 feet northerly from its intersection with Bear Meadow brook.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 5 feet high and 9 inches square. The letter R is cut on the southwest face, N R on the northeast face, and March 2 on the northwest face.

NORTH READING - READING 3 AND WM.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Bear Meadow brook, north 54° 41' west (true bearing) and about 10 feet distant from the witness mark standing 1.5 feet east of the easterly bank of the brook.

MARK. — The witness mark is a granite monument 1.4 feet high and about 8 x 9 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the southwest face, and N R on the northeast face.

NORTH READING - READING 4.

Location. — The corner is situated at the junction of the middle of Ipswich river with the middle of Bear Meadow brook, and is unmarked.

CORNER OF NORTH READING-READING-WILMINGTON AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Ipswich river, south 10° 05' east (true bearing) and about 15 feet distant from the witness mark standing on the northerly bank of the river, in open meadow, at the mouth of a small brook or ditch.

MARK. — The witness mark is a 4 1-4 inch iron pipe 4 feet high, having a 5 1-2 inch iron cap.

NORTH READING - WILMINGTON 1.

Location. — The corner is situated at the edge of the woodland, on the northwest side of Maple street, North Reading, or Salem street, Wilmington, at a point 2,500 feet northeasterly from its intersection with the Salem and Lowell Branch of the Boston & Maine railroad.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 5.3 feet high and about 9 x 10 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the east face, and w on the west face.

NORTH READING - WILMINGTON 2.

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, 15 feet southerly from the center of a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.3 feet high and about 6 x 8 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the east face, and w on the west face.

CORNER OF READING - STONEHAM - WAKEFIELD.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 30.) Location. — The corner is situated 5 feet easterly from a junction of walls, on the southwesterly side of Pope street, at a point about 500 feet northwesterly from its junction with Prospect street, in Stoneham.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.2 feet high and about 9 x 10 inches in section. The letter s is cut on the south face, s on the west face, 's on the north face, and s R on the east face.

CORNER OF READING - STONEHAM - WOBURN.

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, about 100 feet southeasterly from the roadstone in the line between Reading and Woburn standing on the northwesterly side of Walnut street, Reading, or Cedar street, Woburn.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 4.2 feet high and about 9 x 12 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the northeast face, w on the west face, and s on the southeast face.

READING-WAKEFIELD 1.

Location. — The corner is situated 5.5 feet easterly from the southerly end of a wall, on the westerly side of Pratt street, at a point about 300 feet southerly from its junction with Pine street, in Reading.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3 feet high and about 8 x 11 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the north face, and s R on the south face.

READING - WAKEFIELD 2.

Location. — The corner is situated in a cultivated field, 117 feet northeasterly from the roadstone standing on the southwesterly side of Salem street, Reading, or Lowell street, Wakefield, at a point 800 feet northwesterly from its junction with Pratt street, in Wakefield.

Mark.—The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3 feet high and about 8 x 10 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the northeast face, and S R on the south face.

READING-WAKEFIELD 3 AND W.M.

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Brook street, south 35° 21' west (true bearing) and about 80 feet distant from the witness mark standing on the easterly side of the street, at a point 450 feet southerly from its junction with Ash street, in Reading.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough granite monument 4.3 feet high and about 10 inches square. The letter R is cut on the northwest face, and s R on the southeast face.

READING-WAKEFIELD 4.

Location. — The corner is situated in a triangular grass plat, at the junction of Brook street with Summer avenue.

MARK. — The corner mark is a granite monument 3.8 feet high and about 10 x 12 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the west face, and w on the east face.

READING-WAKEFIELD 5 AND W.M.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 30.)

Location. — The corner is situated in the middle of Summer avenue, north 80° 36' east (true bearing) and about 15 feet distant from the witness mark standing on the westerly side of the avenue, at a point about 250 feet southerly from its junction with Elm street.

MARK. — The witness mark is a rough granite monument 4.2 feet high and about 8 x 12 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the northwest face, and s R on the southeast face.

READING-WAKEFIELD 6.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 30.)

Location. — The corner is situated on high land, 5 feet westerly from a junction of walls on the northeasterly side of Hopkins street, at a point 350 feet northwesterly from its junction with South street, in Wakefield.

MARK. — The corner mark is an irregularly-shaped, threesided granite monument 4.8 feet high and about 8 x 11 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the northeast face, and S R on the south face.

READING-WILMINGTON 1.

Location. — The corner is situated on the westerly edge of an open meadow.

Mark. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 3.7 feet high and 4 x 8 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the east face, and w on the west face.

CORNER OF READING-WILMINGTON-WOBURN.

Location. — The corner is situated on high, wooded land, 2 feet northeasterly from the center of a wall.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough, three-sided, granite monument 3.2 feet high and about 10 x 12 x 14 inches in section. The letter R is cut on the southeast face, w on the southwest face, and w on the north face.

TEWKSBURY-WILMINGTON I.

LOCATION. — The corner is situated in woodland, at the southern edge of a wooded swamp, and about 60 feet northeasterly from a wood-road.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4 feet high and about 7 x 8 inches in section, and is unmarked.

TEWKSBURY - WILMINGTON 2.

(FOR SKETCH SEE FOLIO 30.)

Location. — The corner is situated in woodland, about 600 feet westerly from the westerly shore of Silver lake.

MARK. — The corner mark is a rough granite monument 4.4 feet high and about 6 x 8 inches in section. The letter T is cut on the northwest face, and w on the southeast face.
